1) 100% Clean Energy by 2050:

I have supported this enabling legislation in the past while on the Environment Committee. It makes good sense. Though, with our current economic situation in Connecticut -- the only state in the country to not regain jobs lost in the 2008 recession -- with expenses rapidly outpacing revenues, our state fiscal situation is of critical importance. Emergency mode. We need to stabilize our fiscal ship before we place another fee/tax on anyone or anything. So, while I support this concept ( and have supported it in committee), this is not the year to bring this concept forward.

## 4) Plastic Bag Pollution:

Would you support a statewide ban on single-use plastic bags (or a ban/fee hybrid) to significantly reduce plastic bag pollution in our state?

As founding chairman in 1990 of the Darien Environmental Group, I am in strong support of legislation that would ban plastic bags. One of our first projects was to have 5,000 cotton canvas shopping bags made. Many of us still use these bags 25 years later. Truly reduce, reuse, recycle.

## 6) Carbon Pricing:

Would you support carbon pricing for Connecticut?

A very good point on the true cost of fossil fuels, "externalities" as they are also known. We do need to connect people with the knowledge that there is this "cost" to burning fossil fuels and that individually, we can all be part of the solution to address this. It is better policy to incentivize good behavior and not penalize bad behavior to start. With our state fiscal crisis as it is,, another tax on working people and families will not be productive. I'd be in favor of tax incentives to buy energy efficient vehicles, appliances and homes. I'd climate "corporate welfare" to pay for these incentives. After we stabilize our fiscal ship, taxing fossil fuels would be a consideration.

My first involvement in public service was co-founding the Darien Environmental Group in 1990. I served as president of the Darien Land Trust and during my tenure, initiated and protected more open space than all other presidents combined.
