mments:	I support better disclosure, tighter regulations, and any initiative that undermines the PR campaigns of herbicide and pesticide makers. They wield too much influence over our lives.			
Water Source Protection	CT normally uses decades old data for setting standards and guidance for stormwater managementXX Would you support requiring the state to upgrade its standards using scientifically validated, up-to-date statistics on volumes of water associated with extreme storms and annual precipitation?			
mments:	Yes and I believe in stronger regulations that help to mitigate the detrimental effect of large sprawled developments and associated runoff (Wal Mart, Surface Parking, Etc.)			
Microbeads	Many personal care products such as shampoos and toothpaste are being manufactured using tiny plastic microbeads. Once microbeads are washed down the drain, they can enter lakes, rivers, and eventually the ocean through sewage overflows or pass through sewage treatment plants. As a PR executive with Wal Mart, Burson Marsteller, Shandwick and Phlilip Morris, she has been a staunch advocate against environmental health for 25 years in the areas of secondhand smoke, deforestation, sprawl, and the proliferation of nuclear and non-nuclear arms. As a legislator she has supported the rights of businesses over the rights of consumers and their health.
